NAFF IV: National Indigenous Fisheries & Aquaculture Forum

The National Indigenous Fisheries Institute, in partnership with the Government of Canada, will host the Fourth National Indigenous Fisheries & Aquaculture Forum (NAFF IV) in Nanaimo, BC.

This unique conference will bring together Indigenous leaders, government officials, researchers, academics, NGOs, and industry representatives from across Canada, as well as international delegations.

Up to 450 delegates will be able to take advantage of three days of presentations, workshops, and panel discussions on issues of great importance to Indigenous peoples, including participation in the Blue Economy, marine conservation and resource management, aquaculture and mariculture, training and capacity development, food security, and supporting Arctic communities.

NAFF IV will also feature a three-day tradeshow where government agencies, industry representatives, non-profit organizations, and other leaders in fisheries, aquaculture, and peripheral fields can directly engage with delegates and support the collective efforts toward Reconciliation.

Where is NAFF IV?

Nanaimo, British Columbia

Nanaimo is a classic West Coast community, offering natural beauty at every turn, and vast recreation potential. Nanaimo has one of the longest shorelines in Canada, and a forested mountain backdrop just outside downtown.

Nanaimo is located on the east coast of Vancouver Island, north of Victoria and across the Strait of Georgia from Vancouver. The city projects out into the strait like a headland, affording waterfront on three sides and spectacular ocean views at every turn. The local landscape is defined by Mount Benson, which rises 1,006 metres (3,300 feet) just west of Nanaimo, and the Nanaimo River estuary, the largest estuary on Vancouver Island.

KEYNOTE ADDRESS: CHIEF DR. ROBERT JOSEPH, O.C., O.B.C.

Chief Robert Joseph, O.C., O.B.C., is a peace-builder who has devoted his life to promoting reconciliation among Canada's Indigenous and non-Indigenous peoples.

A hereditary chief of the Gwawaenuk First Nation, he is a survivor of the residential school system and helped found Reconciliation Canada, for which he is now an ambassador.

He sits on the National Assembly of First Nations Elders Council and chairs the Native American Leadership Alliance for Peace and Reconciliation. He is also peace and reconciliation ambassador with the Interreligious and International Federation for World Peace (IFWP), where he engages with international leaders to learn from and share his understanding of faith, hope, healing and reconciliation.
